

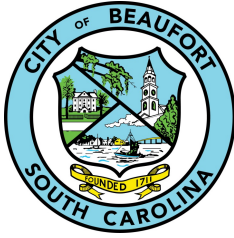

AMERICAN RED CROSS MONTH PROCLAMATION 2022

WHEREAS, March is American Red Cross Month, a special time to honor the kindness of our neighbors who aid families in need every day in the Lowcountry, across the United States and around the world. Their dedication touches millions of lives each year as they carry out the organization's 140-year mission of preventing and alleviating suffering.

WHEREAS, during the trying times of the coronavirus pandemic, people have stepped up to help others in need, whether it was responding to this year's record-breaking disasters across the country or rolling up their sleeves to give blood when our country faced a severe blood shortage.

WHEREAS, here in the Lowcountry, local families have relied on Red Cross of South Carolina volunteers for comfort and hope while coping with a pandemic, home fires, tornadoes, floods and storms. Last year, over 550 active volunteers served in local communities, deployed to local disasters and responded in-person and virtually to national disasters like hurricanes and wildfires. Volunteers also helped more than 1,138 people affected by over 360 home fires in the Lowcountry by addressing their urgent needs like food, lodging and recovery support.

WHEREAS, Red Cross of South Carolina volunteers have supported local families in other ways too. Last year in South Carolina, the Red Cross provided nearly 13,600 case services to U.S. service members, veterans, and their families; collected more than 80,000 units of lifesaving blood; and trained more than 8,800 people in lifesaving skills like First Aid and CPR.

WHEREAS, this lifesaving work is vital to strengthening our community's resilience. Nearly 200 years since the birth of American Red Cross founder Clara Barton, we dedicate this month of March to all those who continue to advance her noble legacy, and we ask others to join in their commitment to care for people in need.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Stephen D. Murray III, Mayor of City of Beaufort, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the laws of Beaufort, and South Carolina, do hereby proclaim March 2022 as Red Cross Month. I encourage all Americans to reach out and support its humanitarian mission.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, South Carolina's future prosperity and quality of life depend on the healthy development of the more than 1.1 million children residing in the diverse communities across our state, with 35,061 in Beaufort County; and

WHEREAS, preventing child abuse and neglect must be a priority that requires individuals, families, child-serving organizations, schools, faith-based groups, businesses, government agencies, and civic leaders to support the physical, emotional, social, and educational well-being of all children; and

WHEREAS, child abuse is a serious public health issue with wide-ranging societal consequences, as data shows the link between the abuse and neglect of children and a wide range of costly medical, emotional, psychological, and behavioral issues into adulthood; and

WHEREAS, parents and caregivers who have a support system of family and friends, know where to find public resources, and understand how to remain resilient in challenging times are best equipped to provide safe, nurturing environments for their children; and

WHEREAS, statewide and community prevention programs serve as proven and effective ways to reduce child abuse and neglect no matter the geographic region, race or ethnicity, or economic status; and

WHEREAS, in fiscal year 2020-2021, there were 8,944 founded Child Protect Services investigations with 15,980 children in South Carolina, and in Beaufort County there were 34 investigations with 226 children.

March 8, 2022

I. CALL TO ORDER

5:00 PM

Mayor Stephen D. Murray III

Members of Council in attendance - Phil Cromer, Neil Lipsitz, Mike McFee, Mitch Mitchell, and Mayor Murray.

II. EMPLOYEE NEW HIRE RECOGNITION

A. Fire Department - Tim Ogden, Fire Chief

Tim Ogden, Fire Chief, introduced Brian Hakes and Kenneth Wright.

B. Public Works - Nate Farrow, Public Works Director

Nate Farrow, Public Works Director, introduced Pedro Orozco-Ramirez.

III. DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Proposed changes to Part 8, Chapter 1, of the Code of Ordinances dealing with solicitation in roadways.

Dale McDorman, Police Chief, stated that this has been on their radar since late 2019. With the changes that have been made recently to travel lanes throughout the city, he feels this needs to be addressed. This change would restrict the handing of any item from a motor vehicle that is in the roadway to someone outside the vehicle. This would have no jurisdiction on private property, or in a private parking lot. When granted a permit to do so, the Solicitors are told they must stay on the sidewalk, but they end up going into the travel lanes, and some have come close to being hit. When he was the Deputy Chief, there was a firefighter in Charleston that was killed while soliciting money in this fashion for a Fill the Boot event. He also mentioned that State Law requires that if solicitation permits are issued, that the police department must have someone supervising the activity, and they do not have the manpower to do this.

Mayor Pro Tem, McFee, asked how many permits we receive in a year. Chief McDorman stated that they have already received two this year.

Members of council voiced that they were in favor of pursuing these changes. It will now be sent to the City Attorney for review to make sure all legal issues have been identified, and that the language is correct.

B. Proposed changes to Part 3, Chapter 2, of the Code of Ordinances dealing with day dock time limitations.

Linda Roper, Downtown Operations and Community Services Director, stated that it has come to their attention, that boats have been tying up at the day dock and staying for a very long time. The suggestion is to impose a time limit allowed for boats to be tied up at the dock. She stated that in the ordinance, she has referred to this as the Beaufort Waterfront Day Dock. They are recommending that no vessel be allowed to tie up to the Beaufort Waterfront Day Dock between 1:00 am to 6:00 am. And that there be a 3-hour time limit imposed when tying up to this dock in a 24-hour period.

There was also discussion on how far a vessel should be allowed to anchor, or moor, from the seawall. Right now, the ordinance reads within 200 feet of the seawall and the Marina Day Dock.

Mayor Murray stated that there is a legitimate argument for encouraging turnover on the dock, just as we do on the streets. He thinks that 3 hours is a reasonable limit.

Councilman Mitchell stated that the name day dock, should be changed to visitor's dock.

Bill Prokop, City Manager, stated that maybe the word transient should be used to describe the dock.

This will also be sent to the City Attorney for review.

C. Update on the plans for Council's Strategic Retreat - April 27 - 28, 2022.

Mayor Murray stated that this is later than we usually have the retreat, but that the consultant was not available until that time. He stated that the Beaufort Code changes were going to be the primary focus of discussion. The retreat will be held at the St. Helena Library.

ORDINANCE

An Ordinance Adopting the 2021 Comprehensive Plan for the City of Beaufort

WHEREAS, Section 6-29-510 provides that a local planning commission's Comprehensive Plan must be updated at least every 10 years; and,

WHEREAS, in 2019, the Beaufort/Port Royal Metropolitan Planning Commission (MPC), and the City of Beaufort authorized and engaged an update of the 2009 Comprehensive Plan for the City of Beaufort; and,

WHEREAS, City Council has sought and enlisted the input of the Metropolitan Planning Commission, the City Boards, City Staff, the project team, and members of the public in the development of the vision of the city as set forth in the Comprehensive Plan; and,

WHEREAS, City Council has conducted workshops and public hearings on the Comprehensive Plan; and,

WHEREAS, members of the Design Review Board, Historic Review Board, and the Metropolitan Planning Commission, along with staff, provided guidance on future land use in the city and potential annexation areas; and,

WHEREAS, the MPC formally reviewed the Comprehensive Plan during five extensive public workshops, and the MPC provided recommendations to City Council; and,

WHEREAS, City Council finds that the document attached to this Ordinance, entitled "2021 Comprehensive Plan-MPC-Final", dated December 2021, represents a fair and accurate compilation of these inputs; and,

WHEREAS, City Council therefore finds that adoption of the document entitled "2021 Comprehensive Plan-MPC-Final", dated December 2021, as the 10-year update of the City's Comprehensive Plan, is in the best interest of the city and citizens of the City of Beaufort;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by Beaufort City Council, in council duly assembled, and by the authority of the same, that the document attached hereto entitled "2021 Comprehensive Plan—MPC-Final", dated December 2021, shall

become the Comprehensive Plan for the City of Beaufort, updating, and replacing all prior comprehensive plans.

Further, all statements contained in the preamble above shall be incorporated and become part of this Ordinance.

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon the 2nd reading and adoption.

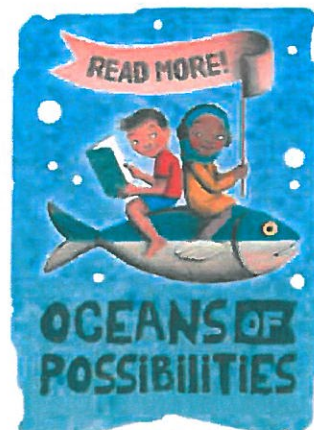

•The City of Beaufort requires that any organization/group sponsoring any event at a City owned facility/property or right of way provide the City of Beaufort with evidence of insurance as outlined below.

General Liability as follows:

- \$500,000.00 minimum requirement per occurrence for General Liability and Auto Liability (depending on the size or type of event, this amount may increase)
- Must provide proof one week before event

Alcohol

- To serve alcohol or liquor at your event, you must obtain City Council approval.
- If alcohol is served at your event, specific approval must be obtained by the City Manager and liquor liability insurance coverage is required with a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence in coverage. The City of Beaufort must be listed as insured on the policy. If you have questions about the required liquor liability insurance coverage and listing the City as an additional insured, please contact the City Manager's office at (843)-525-7070. City of Beaufort does not provide nor obtain insurance coverage for any special events. It is the responsibility of the event organizer to obtain and pay for proper insurance coverage.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

On January 6, 2022, the Treasury released the Final Rule regarding the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, a part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The Final Rule offers a standard allowance for revenue loss of up to \$10 million to be used for reporting purposes to the Treasury. The City will receive a total of \$6,689,031.44 in ARPA funding and can select the standard allowance to streamline reporting requirements.

**A RESOLUTION ELECTING THE STANDARD ALLOWANCE FOR LOST REVENUES
UNDER THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN**

WHEREAS, the Final Rule for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, 31 C.F.R. Part 35 (the “Final Rule”), provides that American Rescue Plan Act Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (“ARPA Funds”) may be used for the provision of government services to the extent of the reduction in the recipient’s general revenue due to the public health emergency, 31 C.F.R. § 35.6(d);

WHEREAS, the Final Rule allows recipients to determine the reduction in general revenue by applying a standard allowance of \$10 million, 31 C.F.R. § 35.6(d)(1), or by applying a formula, 31 C.F.R. § 35.6(d)(2).

WHEREAS, the City of Beaufort, South Carolina (the “Municipality”), intends to apply the standard allowance of \$10 million to determine the reduction in its general revenue during the test period;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

Section 1. The Council of the Municipality hereby elects to apply the standard allowance of \$10 million to calculate the reduction in its general revenue during the test period.

Section 2. The Municipality acknowledges that the Final Rule does not become effective until April 1, 2022. As noted in the Overview of the Final Rule provided by the United States Department of the Treasury, however, “recipients can choose to take advantage of the final rule’s flexibilities and simplifications now, even ahead of the effective date.” *See Coronavirus State & Local Fiscal Recovery Funds: Overview of the Final Rule*, U.S. Department of the Treasury, p. 5. The Municipality is hereby choosing to take advantage of such flexibilities and simplifications.

Section 3. The Municipality acknowledges that the standard allowance is limited to the amount of ARPA Funds actually received by the Municipality. The Municipality therefore declares that the reduction in its general revenue during the test period is equal to the lesser of (a) \$10 million, or (b) the amount of ARPA Funds awarded to and/or received by the Municipality.

Section 4. The Municipality will appropriate the ARPA Funds by budget ordinance, and will expend the ARPA Funds for qualifying purposes, before December 31, 2026.

Section 5. The Manager of the Municipality is hereby authorized and directed to provide such additional documentation, assurances, or certifications as may be required by the United States Government or the State of South Carolina in order to carry out the purposes of this resolution.
